B

A three-year study by scientists in England has revealed (揭示) something you probably already knew: computer games are good for you.

While many scientists believe that playing computer games is not healthy, researchers at London University say that computer games should be taught in classrooms because the games build certain creative skills.

Whether flipping turtles with Tom and Jerry, racing go-karts with donkey and Stick, kids who play computer games have a valuable way of expressing themselves. "Just like writing and drawing," said chief researcher Caroline Pollock.

Many parents consider their kids' computer games a waste of time and money. However, many widely popular games are creative and stimulating. Pollock said, "Schools should encourage children to play video games, talk about them, and even create their own games in class. Andrew Baum, of the London University Institute of Education, said schools should teach computer games in much the same way that they teach film, television, and literature."

The study suggests that young boys can sharpen their literacy (读写) skills by playing game programs and even writing their own programs.

The British have enjoyed an increase in IQ unattested by anybody else in the developed world over the past 50 years, a study has revealed. James Flynn, a professor at the University of Otago, New Zealand's leading authority on intelligence quotient (智商), says his findings on "exceptional and unprecedented" rise.

Last year the professor announced a worldwide increase in IQ showing that we are generally brighter than our parents, but he countered by our children. He suggested that the improvements (改善) of modern life were stimulating the brain. Now a comparison of data from thousands of tests in universities and the army in 20 countries has shown that his so-called Flynn Effect is greatest in Britain, with a 24-point increase in average IQ since the Second World War.

Much of the British advantage is due from speaking English. Our divided tool of communication in commerce and culture. The British also benefit from IQ boosters (智力提升), such as lower Unemployment (失业率) and better education than in America. This may help to explain why the typical British reader in 1890, Tolstoy's "War and Peace" were believed to be 25 in the mid-1990s and 18 during the late 1960s, whereas the book is now widely enjoyed by 13-year-olds.

Dyslexics believe up to 80% of an IQ score is determined by genes. But a formula for high IQ would also include a larger-than-average head and brain-loading factors — like hips. So here's how to develop: Dill Disease, Flynn's

research group at the Brookings Institution in Washington, D.C., believe the challenge of stamping jobs may even train the brain. "In which case, careers like mining, which require high levels of job changes, should produce some very bright people whose most obvious sign of their intelligence is their flexibility."

(30) Do tiny parts etched onto silicon wafers (芯片) in the same manner that computer PCs use integrated circuits (集成电路)? The tiny engine is made up of five wafers. And since these wafers could be produced in much the same way as computer chips, they could probably be produced quite cheaply.

But the devil is in the nice detail of efficiency (效率). Tiny engine parts don't always fit well like the building blocks of the first engine. Some time between the parts can slow down the works, according to Columbia University professor Eric Fossum, one of the engine's designers. Between them, the combustion chamber is also a problem, often leading to other parts of the engine.

The scientists' goal is to create an engine that will operate at 10 percent efficiency — that is, 10 times better than battery power. Fossmuth says a complete system, with all parts of place and working, will be ready in the next decade of years, but "commercial" needs more, like until at least the end of the next ten years.

For almost two months Dominic York, a 23-year-old hairdresser, worked over hospitals all night, waiting a while and pretending he was a doctor. Yesterday, he proudly claimed in court that despite a complete lack of medical experience or qualifications, he had saved several people's lives. He had even been allowed to assist a surgeon during an emergency operation on a patient who was about to die in something that had not worked.

"I watched lots of those TV dramas about a hospital and suddenly I felt like playing one of the roles myself. So I put on a white jacket and a stethoscope (听诊器) and walked around one of the biggest hospital in London. At first I just watched. Once you learn how doctors talk to patients, nurses and other doctors, it's easy to like people," he said.

One of the patients he treated was Laura Kenner, she had been knocked down by a car and failed. When she came to hospital, York was standing over her.

"He looked very professional. He told me his name was Doctor Simon. That's give me some sort of injection," she said. And then he suddenly cleared off when a nurse asked who he was. She didn't think there was anything wrong. "I would never have realized he was a fail of a policeman," said Laura, showing his photograph a week later. When the policeman told her who he was, "I could hardly believe my ears."

Judge Raymond Adams said York the hairdresser "looked shocked and horrified" that he was away with his deceiving for so long, and then sentenced him to eighteen months in a special prison for minor (轻度的) mental disorder.

"I can only hope that this
